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
INTRODUCING PARIS

GENERAL INFORMATION

Paris LMS is going to be run in the **The Palais des congrès de Paris**: is a concert venue, convention centre and shopping mall at the Porte Maillot in the 17th arrondissement of Paris, France. The venue was built by French architect Guillaume Gillet, and was inaugurated in 1974. Nearby the venue are Bois de Boulogne and the affluent neighbourhood of Neuilly-sur-Seine. Located right at the **Porte Maillot metro station**, is very easy to reach.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The best options to get to Palais de Congrès are **Metro line 1 - Porte Maillot station** and **RER C - Neuilly Porte Maillot station**, which connect directly to the building.

The **bus lines 43,73, and 82** also stop at the Palais de Congrès and/or Porte Maillot

Metro lines 2 and 6 as well as RER A and bus lines 22, 30, 31, 52, 92, and 341 stop at the close-by Charles de Gaulle - Etoile station, which is approximately 1 km away and also connects to Metro line 1

MONEY

France is part of the European Union, and the current currency is the **Euro (EUR - €)**. You can pay with credit cards almost everywhere.

You will find places to exchange at transportation hubs and with your hotel. Rates vary and often are better the further away from a major hub you are.






WEATHER

The weather in Paris in September is **variable**, alternating sunny days with slightly more rainy ones.

The temperature range is forecasted to be on the wider side, with **highs of 22°C/72°F** and **lows of 13°C/55°F**

Autumnal attire is recommended, with light jackets and sweaters, as well as some summer wear for warmer hours.

In August, the sun rises approximately at 7:30 and sets around 20:00






ELECTRICITY VOLTAGE AND PLUGS

In France the power plugs and sockets are of type C and E. The standard voltage is 230 V and the standard frequency is 50 Hz.

You can use your electric appliances in France if the standard voltage in your country is in between 220 - 240V (as is in the UK, Europe, Australia and most of Asia and Africa).

If your devices are made only for 100V and 127V (such as in the US, Canada and most South American countries) you **cannot use them** and you will need a **voltage converter**.





OTHER INFORMATION

Opening hours of stores in Paris **are usually from 9:30 to 19:30 from Monday to Saturday**. Department stores in the city usually stay open until later.

It is possible for the shops located on the Avenue des Champs-Élysées and other **tourist areas** to also **open on Sundays from 11 to 19** approximately.

BY PLANE



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Air travel is for sure the easiest way to get to Paris, as it is served by two airports: **Charles de Gaulle (CDG)** and **Orly (ORY)**.

If we factor in **Beauvais airport (BVA)**, a few kilometers outside the city, we have a total of three large airports to choose from.

Thanks to the Paris **underground train line (RER)** it is really convenient to get anywhere, and above all **Charles de Gaulle** is well connected because it is located directly on the **RER B**.



BY PLANE - Charles de Gaulle



There are **RER B trains every 10-15 minutes** connecting CDG to the city center. They stop at Paris are Gare du Nord (25 minutes), Châtelet-Les-Halles (28 minutes) and Denfert-Rochereau (35 minutes).

You can also take **Bus 350** towards Gare de l'Est station or **Bus 351** towards Place de la Nation. The journey time of both lines is 45-60 minutes and its frequency varies between 15 and 35 minutes. Both lines operate approximately between 5:30 and 21:30.

At night you have **two night bus lines (Noctilien 140 and 143)** that connect Charles de Gaulle with the Gare de l'Est station.



BY PLANE - Orly



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The Orlyval train connects Orly Airport with the Antony RER B station. It takes about 33 minutes and the ticket price is € 10.90.

The Airport is connected to the Pont de Rungis station by the "Paris par le train" bus. There you can take the RER line C to get to the center. It takes about 35 minutes in total to get to the city center.

There are **3 city bus lines** that connect Orly with Paris. The ticket price is 2€ and is therefore the cheapest and most direct way to get to the center:

- Line 183 to Porte de Choisy station (50 min). Connects with Metro line 7 and tram line 3
- Line 285 to the RER C - D Juvisy station and with the Louis Aragon metro line 7 station (15 minutes)



BY PLANE - Beauvais



Being situated in a different city altogether, Beauvais airport is not as well connected as the other two, but there are some options.

Many airlines offer **shuttle buses** to the city center. The price is 15 € and the journey time is 75 minutes with terminus at **Porte Maillot**, near the Arc de Triomphe, where you can take metro line 1 and RER line C.

The price of a taxi from Beauvais Airport to the center of Paris varies between € 140 and € 170, depending on traffic and time. It is therefore not a convenient option. You can also book a transfer service to the city center which will take around 130€. A driver will be waiting for you at the exit holding a sign with your name in his hand.



BY TRAIN



There is no direct train from Paris Charles de Gaulle Airport (CDG) to Arc de Triomphe. However, there are services departing from Aéroport Charles de Gaulle 2 and arriving at Charles de Gaulle - Etoile via Châtelet les Halles. The journey, including transfers, takes approximately 53 min.

The ticket price is around 6-11 €.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Paris and its suburbs are divided into 6 faring zones, with **Zones 1 and 2** covering the city center and ALL Métro lines. The **same ticket (t+ ticket)** is valid on the Métro, tram, buses and RER.

On the Métro, one ticket is good for any destination, even if the station is beyond Paris city limits. On the RER, one ticket is good only within Paris. **You can transfer freely between the two for 2 hours** following the first validation

Bus/bus, bus/tram and tram/tram transfers are permitted for up to 90 minutes (from first to last check-in).

Night buses run everyday between 1 a.m. and 5.30 a.m., while the Métro is closed, and have their own tickets and fares.

Smoking is not allowed on any public vehicle

METRO



PARIS METRO

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
The Métro is the cheapest, easiest and fastest way to get around Paris. There are 16 metro lines and some 300 metro stations; the entrance is indicated by a large yellow letter 'M'.

Metros run **every day** from 6:00 to 00:45 (from Sunday to Thursday) or at 01:45 (on Friday and Saturday).

The frequency at which metros run depends on the time and day, up to 2 minutes in peak hours.

Metro tickets cost 1.90 € each (18.60 € for 10 - ask for 'un carnet'). You can buy tickets at automatic ticket machines in metro stations, in tobacconists and on the website

RER (SUBURBAN EXPRESS RAILWAY)

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The RER train network consists of 5 lines that serve Paris and the Paris region (Ile-de-France). Each line has a distinctive colour that is shown on RATP and SNCF signs and maps.

RER trains **start running at approximately 06:00 and stop running at around 00:45** every day – including public holidays.

Within Paris, the RER operates in more or less the same way as the metro, except that you need to put your ticket through the automatic barriers **a second time on the way out**. If your RER station has a connection with the metro, you can use the same ticket for the whole journey.



BUS, TRAM & NOCTILIEN



64 bus lines complement the metro network. For a good estimate of your journey time, allow around 5 minutes per stop, sometimes more if the traffic is busy.

Buses run **Monday to Saturday, 7:00 to 20:30**. The 3 outer PC lines and all the lines serving the stations and the larger traffic hubs also operate in the evening up to 00:30. About **half the bus lines operate on Sundays and public holidays**. Just put your hand out at the bus stop to signal you wish to hop on!

There are also 12 Tram Lines, although most of them run on the outskirts of Paris. Except for lines T4 and T11, you can use the same ticket as for the bus.

If you need to travel at night, the 47 Noctilien lines operate from 00:30 to 05:30. You can use the t+ ticket, but special fares apply outside of the first 2 zones. More info at: <https://www.ratp.fr/en/getting-around-night/its-easy-get-around-night>

TAXI

There are 18 000 official taxis serving in the entire Paris metropolitan area. They are usually luxurious black cars with the white sign "TAXI PARISIEN", showing green lights when free and red lights when busy, on their roof.

The base fee is €7.10, the kilometer price is €1.07 (1.35 after 5 pm and on sundays). For standing and waiting time, €35.80 is charged per hour(€38.50 after 5 pm and on sundays). Reserving a taxi in advance is 7€.

The three major taxi apps to download are **G7, Taxis Bleus** and **Alpha Taxis**. The most used by Parisians is G7 with a very good rate. You can also call the following numbers:

Uber is also an option in Paris, with comparable prices.



TRAM & NOCTILIEN



Paris has 4 tramway lines serving the perimeter of the city: T1, T2, T3, T4.

Tram tickets are the same as those used on the metro and the RER in Paris.

The Noctilien is a night bus service that operates in Paris and the Paris region from 12.30am to 5.30am. 47 lines crisscross Paris and the Paris region so that everyone can get around by public transport.



You can use your travel pass or a metro/bus ticket if it covers the zones concerned (the same zones as for the metro/RER).

Tour Eiffel

Born as a temporary structure on the occasion of the Universal Exposition of 1889, the Eiffel Tower has been the symbol of Paris for more than 130 years.

The best place to admire the Eiffel Tower in all its splendor is the monumental terrace of the Trocadéro opposite of it, at the Trocadero metro station.

The Eiffel Tower lights up every day from sunset to 1am. Moreover, at the stroke of every hour, the lights become a golden and sparkling coating, adorning the tower for 5 minutes, while this beacon shines on Paris.




Louvre Museum

There's a plethora of unmissable works of art in the eight curatorial departments of this world famous museum, so we recommend that art lovers spend at least a day visiting it or, if the time available is short, prepare a program suited for their interests before the visit.

Even for the less artistically inclined, walking among the wonders kept in the ancient fortress will be a delight for the eyes.

The museum is **open every day from 9:00 to 18:00** except Tuesdays, January 1st, May 1st and December 25th.

It is mandatory to book an entrance with time and date for all visitors. The closing of the halls begins at 17:30. At the moment the evening opening is suspended due to the Covid-19 health emergency.




Arc de Triomphe

In 1806, Napoleon I ordered the construction of the Arc de Triomphe in honor of the Grand Army.

Inspired by the arches of antiquity, this emblematic monument bears the illustrious names of the nation and houses the tomb of the unknown soldier, whose flame is renewed every evening.

A new museography now makes it possible to better understand the history of the monument, as well as its national and international symbolic importance. From the terrace it is possible to admire, during the day and in the evening, a unique view of the Elysian Fields.



Notre-Dame

Since April 15th 2019, the city of Paris is no longer the same: a horrifying fire devastated the Notre Dame Cathedral, Gothic masterpiece and UNESCO World Heritage Site. Luckily, the structure is overall safe even if heavily damaged.

To get the best view of Notre Dame now that it's no longer possible to reach the square in front of its facade, we suggest you go to quai Saint Michel or quai Montebello (left bank / Latin quarter) or in front of the famous Shakespeare and Company bookshop.



Champ Elysees

The avenue of the Champs-Élysées is one of the most famous promenades in the world.

This long street is divided into two parts. The first one, next to Place de la Concorde, is characterized by gardens that host four restaurants (Ledoyen, Laurent, Gabriel, Elysées-Lenôtre), two theaters (Marigny and Rond-Point) and a pavilion dedicated to catering and entertainment (Espace Cardin).

Starting from the roundabout called the Rond-Point, an important traffic junction in this area of Paris, the scenery changes and a défilé of buildings, restaurants and shops begins. In this area, there are high fashion boutiques, elegant car salons, several cinemas and the notorious Lido, one of the most famous Parisian cabarets.



Canal Saint-Martin

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Built at the request of Napoleon in the early 1800s, it is a relaxing and extremely pleasant place, ideal for spending a few hours outdoors between walks and bike rides.

Strolling along the canal lined with sycamore trees and adorned with delightful bridges and walkways, or sailing along its course on one of the boat cruises, you will discover an unusual and retro Paris and an infinity of suggestive and poetic views.



Disneyland Paris

Disneyland Paris is one of the most famous parks in the world and it needs no introduction. What we recommend is to plan your itinerary by selecting the attractions you don't want to miss (the Disney Illuminations show at the closing time of the park, with the Sleeping Beauty Castle in the background, would be one of our top choices).

Buy your admission ticket online well in advance, download the official Disneyland Paris app and avoid Saturdays and Sundays. If you want to eat in a typical restaurant in the park, book in advance so as not to run the risk of running out of food.

Where: La Défense district, between CNIT and Westfield les 4 Temps


Opening hours: 11:30 AM - 10 PM

Where: Porte de la Muette, Bois de Boulogne, 75016 Paris.

Opening hours: from Monday to Thursday (2:00 PM - 12:00 AM), Fridays and Saturdays (11:00 AM - 1:00 AM), on Sundays (11:00 AM - 12:00 AM)

Description: The Fête À Neu-Neu was one of the most famous fairgrounds of the pre-war period. Created by Napoleon 1st in 1815 at the request of the parishioners of Neuilly, it has become over the years an entertaining meeting place for the whole family. This event offers a hundred attractions and of course the traditional candy apples, waffles and cotton candy. You can take a ride on the Ferris Wheel to see the Lacs du Bois, Paris, the Eiffel Tower and the Longchamp racecourse from a height of more than 60 meters above the ground.



Pâtisseries & Boulangeries

Though its international use is far less restrictive, the term '**pâtisserie**' is legally controlled in France. Only pastry shops with licensed maître pâtissier have the right to call themselves a pâtisserie.

A **boulangerie** is a French bakery. Bakeries must bake their bread on-premises to hold the title of 'boulangerie' in France. It's in boulangeries that you can find the best **baguettes**: long, slim loaves of bread famous all over the world. Make sure they have pointy tips (signs they're hand-made) and a golden brown colour.



Food and Restaurants - Viennoiseries



Viennoiseries are the baked pastries we all know and love. You can find them in every Boulangerie.

Croissants (literally "growing", from their shape resembling a crescent moon) are the perfect way to start your day with a genuine Parisian breakfast. They may look simple, but these perfectly flaky pastries require time to perfect, and French bakers are very proud of their craftsmanship.



Also very famous is **pain au chocolat**, absolutely wonderful fresh out of the oven. It's a buttery square of puff pastry rolled onto one or more bars of chocolate.

Food and Restaurants - Croque Monsieur/Madame

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Though it may look like a simple sandwich, it's actually a true flavour explosion.

It consists of a grilled toast with ham and cheese (usually emmental or gruyère), topped with a crust of grated cheese, while more elaborate version also include bechamel. Another version is the Croque Madame, so called because the egg on top resembles a lady's hat.

Food and Restaurants - Crêpes



A symbol of French cuisine, impossible not to love. You can find them in both sweet and savory versions and they are absolutely delicious.

You can find this traditional dish in dedicated restaurants called **crêperies**. However, you can also enjoy them at itinerant kiosks all over the city.



There are many varieties of crêpes, but undoubtedly the most famous is the **Crêpe Suzette**, imbued in orange sauce and Grand Marnier liqueur, cooked flambè.




Paris by Night - Take a classic Seine river cruise

Whether you've always dreamt of seeing a Parisian cabaret show or you're just curious, consider adding one to your list of what to do in Paris at night!




Paris by Night - Admire the Eiffel Tower light show

LOCAL RECOMMENDATIONS

- “Montmartre is a district that you cannot miss. It is full of quaint streets, museums, windmills and the Sacre Coeur Basilica on top of the hill and visible from all over Paris. Beautiful for a walk.”
- “Be careful if you want to visit the local churches, as they close very early! Sometimes you have to pay for a ticket, but the price is really negligible. the Savory crepes in the local shops are the best food I have tried in Paris!”
- “If you are an art lover you cannot miss the Orangerie museum! It turns quickly (in about an hour) but is full of masterpieces and was built in an old orange grove. Beautiful! And Monet's paintings strike the heart.”

LOCAL RECOMMENDATIONS



- “When talking about museums in Paris, one immediately thinks of the Louvre, but few mention the Musée d'Orsay. Really very beautiful and rich and right in front of the Louvre. It was thrilling to see Van Gogh's famous self-portrait live!”
- “If you want to have a royal breakfast, go to the "Du Pain et Des Idées" a stone's throw from the Canal Saint Martin. I tasted the house specialty, the Sacristain, full of delicious cream! Instead, I was a bit disappointed with the Bastille, which in my mind were the remains of the fortress and instead there is practically nothing left.”
